# **PREVIOUS MEETINGS**

<u>March A meeting (4<sup>th</sup>)</u> This was the Spring Surplus Equipment Sale. There was a smaller quantity of gear for sale - and fewer sellers - than has traditionally been the case. <u>March B meeting (18<sup>th</sup>)</u> This followed the usual Fix-it, Move-it-on and Social Chat format. We had a repeat visit from Ian Mallinson, an ex-CBer, who has now acquired one of the fairly up-market Yaesu rigs and is now learning to drive it. We were also visited by Eddie Wesson a youngster who is getting interested in amateur radio via the CB route: he was accompanied by his father who was and ex-CBer himself many years ago. We hope to see one or both again.

# **FUTURE MEETINGS**

<u>April A meeting (8<sup>th</sup>)</u> (Please note that this is on the second, rather than first, Monday as the first is Easter Monday Bank Holiday). Annual General Meeting. As mentioned earlier, this is a formal opportunity to have your say what you think about the club and what it does now, and to suggest possible changes. It includes a review of 2023/24 activities and also the election of club officers for 2024/25. Forms allowing members to nominate the Secretary and Committee members were emailed out recently, but in case you have mislaid them, a copy of the forms are attached at Annex A. When completed, these can be handed in right up until the start of the AGM. The agenda and notes of last year's AGM will follow shortly. Hope to see you there!

<u>May A meeting (13<sup>th</sup>)</u> Again this will be the second Monday of the month as a result of the high concentration of Bank Holidays at this time of year! The focus will be VHF National Field Day which takes place this year on the weekend of 6<sup>th</sup> / 7<sup>th</sup> July. It will open with a replay of one of the RSGB "Tonight at Eight" video series describing what VHF NFD is all about and showing a video of a Scottish group's participation in 2023. This should give previous non-attenders a chance to see what it is like and consider whether they might like to join the usual suspects in 2024! This will be followed by a discussion of SRCC's intended participation in 2024. (For the last decade or so our activity has been from a site on Warlingham Ridge as part of North-East Surrey Contest Group - a loose confederation of SRCC, Coulsdon ATS (CATS), Addiscombe ARC (in earlier years) and a few non-club aligned individuals and we expect this to be the case this year too). It will be a chance to plot out what we intend to do, what section to enter, etc. and put together outline plans while we still have eight weeks to hammer out the details.

<u>June A meeting (3<sup>rd</sup>)</u> Subject to confirmation this will be on the subject of nanoVNAs, which are proving to be very useful and flexible items of test gear and are now owned by a fair number of SRCC members. It is expected to open with a demonstration of their operation (what they can do and how to drive them), followed by a discussion for those already partially "skilled in the art" on how to upload new software versions.

<u>B meetings</u>, Unless, specifically advised otherwise, these will continue to take place on the third Monday of the month (though April "B" is on the 4<sup>th</sup> Monday) and will follow the current Fix-it, Moveit-on and Social Chat format.

# COMMONWEALTH CONTEST (A.K.A BERU) 2024 BY QUIN G3WRR

The February issue included an item describing my preparations for this year's Commonwealth Contest from the Isle of Wight. Now it's all done and dusted (although perhaps done and mudded might be a better term this year) this item closes off the loop by relating how it all went.

Having packed the trusty (but now seriously aged) Volvo estate the night before (apart from a few expensive bits of gear such as the K3 which went in on Friday morning), after leaving Mission Control Norwood at about 6.30am on the Friday I took the 8.30am ferry from Portsmouth to Fishbourne and reached Brighstone Holiday Centre on the South-West facing side of the island at around 10.30am. I had been advised by Charlotte (the lady who runs the site) that it wouldn't be possible to drive the car to the chalet we use because of the saturated ground: She wasn't kidding.....it was possible to push the stakes about 9 inches into the ground before needing to use the sledge hammer to finish them off, but getting them out was really hard because of the suction – finally overcome by a big heave and accompanied by a loud sucking noise. But Charlotte and her son Barney helped me carry all the gear round from the car park to the chalet. (Luckily the days of using AR88s in such events are long past, otherwise we would have been in real trouble).

I had decided not to use the usual Titan DX all band vertical this year as it is quite large and fiddly to set up – and I have been unable to persuade it provide the lower SWR promised on all bands. So instead a Hy-Gain 14AVQ multiband vertical (only about 20ft tall and much lighter) was used for 40/20/15/10m. This proved to be very much easier to erect and, having carefully followed the manufacturer's guidance of dimensions, provided a usable SWR on all bands without use of the internal ATU in the K3. This was backed up on 80m by a vertical of just under 40ft comprising a length of wire taped to a DX Commander mast (as advertised recently by a well-known dealer in Radcom). This is made of a composite material in ten sliding sections (rather like Russian Dolls), it is light, shrinks down to about 2.5ft in length for transit and is excellent value for money at just under £60. The only downside was that it is pretty whippy and my initial Cunning Plan to use it as part of an inverted L proved unrealistic. Although it is about 35ft tall when extended I managed to sneak about another five feet of antenna length by putting its base on a sort of raised patio outside the chalet and the antenna feed point at ground level below. (The picture below may make this comprehensible ...). Use of an automatic ATU not only avoided fiddling with the length to get a good SWR on 80m (always a time consuming and sometimes frustrating task) but allowed its use on the other bands.

So, all set up and feeling smug with antennas and gear ready to go, it was time for a meal the Three Bishops (not an ecclesiastical establishment but a pub) in Brighstone village. Fortunately it was much quieter than last time we visited it before the IOTA contest last July and a good meal was delivered and eaten with no undue delay. On return to the chalet (it's surprising how dark it gets when you're away from the likes of Croydon but a torch had been remembered this time) I noted that the wire of 80m vertical had sagged drastically but repair was stood over until Saturday morning. "And so to bed" to quote Samuel Pepys, but probably in less comfort than Mr Pepys. It was seriously cold so I slept fully clothed in my sleeping bag. Come the morning the vertical was easily fixed: keeping the mast extended relies on friction between the sections, and I had simply not pulled them apart firmly enough to provide sufficient friction. More elbow grease, and taping up the joints, ensured no further problems.

The contest kicked off at 1000UTC with a promising start on 10m with 5Z (Kenya). 5B (Cyprus) and 9H (Malta) "in the book" in the first quarter hour – but after that 10m, of which great things had been expected because of the state of the sunspot cycle, proved disappointing with only a total of nine contacts on that band overall. Between 1030 and 2000 activity mainly alternated between 20m & 15m with the greatest number of contacts being from VE (Canada) with occasional others including VK (Australia), 6Y (Jamaica), ZF (Cayman Islands), VU (India) and ZD7 (St. Helena) Following a 2.5 hour sleep, the focus of activity had changed to 40m & 80m yielding a further 32 contacts, again largely with Canada. After a further, somewhat extended, sleep (I'm getting old...) from 0015 until 0615, it was just a case of mopping up until the close at 0959 which yielded a further 16 contacts across all five bands including the only contact with ZL (New Zealand) on 40m at 0625. Looking back at the log is a reminder that one of the key features of keeping the contact rate up is changing bands frequently. It shows 35 band changes over the 24 hours – many of which yielded only a single contact – and there were no doubt more "invisible" changes from which no contacts resulted. The total tally was 129 contacts (my best so far) from 14 Commonwealth countries including all continents except South America and Antarctica.....

This year I had decided to stop overnight on Sunday rather than rushing home that evening so after another sleep, the station was dismantled and the car reloaded before another meal at the Three Bishops in the evening.(where this time a lady was playing the harp – a nice touch). The meal was certainly welcome, as my examination of the weekend's residue showed that between Friday evening and Sunday evening I had eaten only three Pot Noodles and two Bovril sandwiches (although accompanied by large quantities of tea). After a proper night's sleep the journey back across the wild Solent was uneventful and I was back home by about noon on the Monday – but the car remained loaded until the following day...Roll on BERU 2025...

My overall view of the event this year – which seems to align with the general view from contestants - was that 10m and 80m (but particularly 10m) had been disappointing with the majority of traffic on 40m, 20m & 15m which were in good shape. The general view (largely from operators more experienced than myself) was that this was a result of the high SFI having been offset by high A & K indices...hum ho, that's HF propagation for you....

Our fellow SRCC member Alun G4WGE was also on in the contest from a site near the River Severn and made 173 contacts. Also active was Mike G3VYI (whom some of you have met) who is an inveterate BERU "Traveller" and was this year operating from a site near the sea in Jamaica using the call 6Y6YI (try decoding that one when you've had no sleep...). The pictures below show two very different sites – the one I used on the Isle of Wight and the one used by Mike on Jamaica - make - make your own mind up on which you would prefer!

G4FFY and G3ZPB retain first and second positions: G3WRR moves down two places to bottom place, and as a consequence G4FYF and M0LEP both move up one place to third and fourth.

The following notes come from the entrants...

**G4FFY:** I mainly operated in the 2m and 70cm FT8 AC's and 2m & 70cm UKAC's, plus on HF in the first of the RSGB FT4 AC Contest. Also did some HF FT8 operation using only 10W. 10m was also good though mainly used the normal 100W!! Overall a low activity month Amateur Radio wise though doubled my Jan 2024 score!! As of end-February 2024, I'm now on 161 DXCC's, one added with the working of St. Helena ZD7CTO on 10m FT8 on 21<sup>st</sup> Feb 2024.

**G3ZPB:** 83 points - all except for a Special Event call were made during contests; 70cms AFS, 70cms FT8 and HF FT4. No special DXCC this month.

**G4FYF:** Another leisurely month dabbling with the airwaves. Action spread between 7, 14, & 28 MHz.

**MOLEP:** I've not been on air much in February, but here's my entry for the month. Most of this has been SOTA chasing, with ten metres bringing in just about everything more than a thousand miles away, and the occasional rather closer ground-wave contacts, too. SOTA is having a Ten Metres Challenge this year, so I hope I'll be able to add some more interesting DX using the band later in the year.

**G3WRR:** A few points made using the club call in the 70cm AFS contest.

The cumulative scores are shown below. No change in relative positions in February – however Ray G4FFY extends his percentage lead over Peter G3ZPB from 165% to 222%.
