PREVIOUS MEETINGS

December A meeting (2nd) This was a video evening in which recordings of two talks given at the RSGB Convention on 12th/13th October were shown. Rather Janus like, one looked back deep into the history of the hobby and the other took a look ahead on the future of amateur radio licensing and education. The former was given by Don Beattie G3BJ (formerly G3OZF) and described the first trans-world amateur radio contact in 1924 (between Mill Hill School in London and a sheep farm (!) in New Zealand) and the events leading up to it. Don is always a skilled and interesting presenter, and this was up to his usual standard. The latter was delivered by Rafal Lukawiecki EI6LA – an amateur younger than many of us, and originally from Poland. He had a very interesting and humorous style of presentation which focussed on his work with IRTS for the new Harmonised Amateur Radio Examination Certificate (HAREC). <u>December B meeting (16th)</u> This was not quite the usual Fix-it, Move-it-on and Social Chat format session, although a good amount of social chat took place It was the usual pre-Christmas session with savouries, mince pies, soft drinks, tea and coffee - as well as alcoholic drinks kindly provided by Pat G4FDN and Paul G7VAK. One of the historical places that those of us living in the Croydon area will be aware, and quite possibly proud, of is the Crystal Palace. There is a large amount of information on its life and demise in 1936 on the internet but recently I came across a particularly interesting mix of pictures and historical information at https://heritagecalling.com/2021/11/29/picturing-the-crystal-palace/. It's well worth a read.

Apart from the pure historical aspects, there is a link with early communications: John Logie Baird and his assistants conducted some early television experiments from one of the water towers shown in the pictures on the website. I also understand that one of his assistants was Ray Herbert G2KU who used to live in Sanderstead (and whose particulars are oddly still shown on QRZ.com!). Ray was a member of the SRCC member, but I first remember talking to him as a member of the Purley Club in the 1960s.

The following notes are provided by the entrants...

G4FFY: Activity in November was all contest based. On HF it was the 160m Club Calls and the FT4 contests, whilst on VHF it was the 2m UKAC, and 2m and 70cm FT8 Contests. DXCC's worked remains at 163.

M0CGF: Managed to score 6,095 points in the 6m UKAC assuming I don't get any knocked off. [Editor's note – as adjudicator for that contest I couldn't possibly comment...] Only spent the first 10mins and last 40mins of the contest. Going to try and get 160m up and running over Xmas so let's see! Got a 9:1 unun and about 175ft of wire to play with!

G3WRR: A real non-zero entry for a change! All claimed QSOs were made in the CQWW CW contest: this is always a good opportunity for making a good country total and (if you're lucky which I largely wasn't) also for picking up new rare ones. Struggled for about half an hour trying to get DUOA (Philippines) on 40m without success. But ho hum, it's only a hobby...

G4FYF: Radio fun time limited this month. six of nine QSOs on 10 meters, rest 40 meters. Interesting QSO with U4MIR, a retired cosmonaut who was commander of mission to Salyut 7 followed by two missions to the Mir space station.



MOLEP: Storm Darragh has given my hex beam a twist, so I'll have to get out and set it back to pointing straight when the storm's over. For now, it's stuck pointing somewhere generally southeast-ish. The DXCCs were mostly from SOTA chasing, with ten metres providing all but one of them. The SRCC Monday morning 80 metre net of course also gives me one reliable SRCC contact.

The positions have not changed since last month, and Ray's lead now seems to be unassailable.

The summary of the present conditions is almost identical to last month's viz. SFI unpredictable on a day-to-day basis but still well above the predictions. The source of the predictions was the SolarHam website operated by VE3EN at https://solarham.com/index.htm. For those interested in solar activity (both generally and in the terms of its impact on radio propagation) it's well worth a look. In addition to large amounts of (regularly updated) data on various aspects of the topic, it contains very clear explanations of some of the solar-weather related terms (such as coronal hole, coronal mass ejection, geomagnetic storm etc.) we know but may not understand fully.
