PREVIOUS MEETINGS

This had been intended to take the form of an RSGB video from last year's event, followed by a discussion led by Ray G4FFY to focus attendees' minds. But alas Ray was at short notice unable to attend and despite determined efforts by Colin G4LZE and Pat G4FDN, the necessary internet connection could not be set up – and the slidepack was on Ray's computer and hence not amongst those present!

Nevertheless a discussion took place amongst those who were and a number of valid points were raised – most of which had already been addressed in the slidepack (which has been sent post event to the attendees) and form the basis of a plan. More to follow later in this issue....

May B meeting (20th) This followed the current Fix-it, Move-it-on and Social Chat format.

FUTURE MEETINGS

<u>June A meeting (3rd)</u> This will be on the subject of NanoVNAs, which are proving to be very useful and flexible items of test gear and are now owned by a fair number of SRCC members. It will open with a demonstration by Quin G3WRR of their operation (what they can do and how to drive them). It had been hoped that Pat G4FDN would be able to attend on the date to tell us about uploading new software versions but he will be away then so perhaps he can be persuaded to do so at a later date.

June B meeting (17th) This will follow the current Fix-it, Move-it-on and Social Chat format.

<u>July A meeting (1st)</u> Construction Contest. This will follow its usual format. For those who have not attended before, the aim is for members to bring along any items they have built which they think might be of interest to others. These can be either fully home built or kits – anything you like really - and contributors are encouraged to give a brief description of the item and its background. Attendees can then vote on their favourites – quite straightforward...no multiple transferrable votes or stuff like that – and there will be prizes...cups for the first and second positions (being "in the ironwork" we call it...) and our treasurer (Ray "twisted arm" Howells G4FFY) has been persuaded to fund small financial prizes for the leading three entries.

July B meeting (15th) This will follow the current Fix-it, Move-it-on and Social Chat format.

REMEBRANCE OF PETER G3ZPB by PAT G4FDN

I first met Peter at an SRCC meeting sometime between 1973 and 1974, as best I can recall. I had first attended the SRCC in December 1972 and then applied for membership a few months later. It is likely Peter was already a member when I joined, but without a membership list from 1973 or 1974 I can't be certain (John G3MCX could probably verify). I know Peter got his callsign less than a year before I got G8FDN in August 1972. We didn't have our first QSO until the 12th September 1975 at 1810 GMT on 145.000 MHz FM. Peter was operating /A from Pound Street in Carshalton where he had opened a small shop/office as part of the Amateur Radio Bulk Buying Group (ARBBG). I became a fairly frequent visitor to this establishment to get components and cables, etc, as I lived close by. As I recall, the Essex part of the ARBBG later morphed into Ambit

International and then Maplin Electronic. Peter himself moved on to found Catronics with a shop in Wallington Square. The SRCC started a 2 metre FM Net on 145.35MHz late in 1975 and Peter was quite a regular participant in this often operating /Mobile. The SRCC had been a participant in the RSGB's HF and VHF field days since their inception and Peter joined the club's VHF operating team and was an avid participant up until his death. In the 80's with the introduction of relatively low cost home computers Peter became active on packet radio and later went on to host the club's packet radio node/BBS at his home. Peter and I had some things in common both being Chartered Electrical Engineers and members of the IEE (now IET) but we often disagreed on things to do with club administration. Peter had several stints on the SRCC committee and was Chairman in the 1990's and later in 2017 for a further 3 years. My last QSOs with Peter were on digital voice (FreeDV and DSTAR) on 2m and 70cm. Peter contributed a lot to the SRCC throughout his life and he would have no doubt contributed a lot more had his life not been cruelly cut short by cancer. 73, Pat

VHF NFD 2024

SRCC will as usual be taking part in VHF National Field Day (VHF NFD) as part of North-East Surrey Contest Group (NESCG) together with members from CATS and others with no specific club affiliation. The date this year is 6th/7th July although we are likely to be on site from the afternoon of July 5th. We will (subject to confirmation from Nick the farmer) be operating from Warren Barn Farm from a field on the right-hand side (going out from Warlingham) of the A269 Croydon Road / Limpsfield Road.

We are expecting to be operating on 6m / 4m / 2m / 70cm and possibly 23cm. We appear to be OK for equipment but likely to be short of people as we are two of the "usual suspects" down. THE ADVANTAGES OF VAPING?

My daughter's partner uses disposable vapes. I was curious about how these things are powered so decided to tear them apart. First was a stick type.



Prised out bottom plug with small screwdriver then peeled back the metal casing with long-nosed pliers in a fashion I guess we've all used to open a tin of corned beef when the key breaks!

That done, quick tap, and the innards slid out. That revealed a lithium polymer cell, the radial terminals soldered to a small circuit board housing a small microcontroller and a small heating element capsule.

Desoldered the cell that showed a terminal voltage of 2.2V so,

potentially, a future life for it. The cell label describes this size 13300, 3.7V, 360mAh. About an hour charge of 5V at 200mA brought it up to 4.2V, normal for 3.7V rated cells.

Next was a small, squat plastic type.





This was simpler to dismember, run a utility knife blade around the bottom glued seal and prise apart with screwdriver.



Again, a lithium cell with axial terminals giving 3.6V. About 0.5 hour with same charge conditions got it to 4.2V. Label described it as size 13300, 3.7V, 360mAh.

I shall keep on collecting these 'cos I see potential (excuse the pun!) use in various projects I knock up. Add a cheapo USB charge control module, away we go!

Beware: If you attempt similar, please take care not to distort or damage the battery that may have hazardous/dangerous consequences. Also, given their form factor, their is a danger of accidental shorting of the terminals – not good (trust me!). So don't just chuck them in the junk box for storage!

[Editor's note: I had a bit of additional information from Steve about the background to the above: "Although not obvious in that piece, there is a hidden radio link. The battery on my old, cheapo, Baofeng went kaput. Price to replace was much more than I paid for the radio that I very infrequently use. So used 2 slightly bigger cells reclaimed from laptop battery pack boxed, strapped to the back. Not elegant but works! Similarly, fed up with short charge life of my MFJ antenna analyser batteries, used 4 cells, again strapped to the back to give extended life especially when down the garden tweaking antennas. Could be, I'm just tight!]

and found a promising looking toy shop (this must have been in the days before computer games and text messages when youngsters used to gain their amusement from making catapults to terrorise animals and pensioners...). He asked whether they sold ¼" by ¼" catapult elastic and was assured that they did: but when the lady behind the counter asked him how much he wanted and he told her he needed 18ft, he got a most peculiar look! But we built it, and it proved fearsomely impressive (though a bit uncontrollable). Such things would not be approved of by the Health and Safety community these days of course....

The following notes come from the entrants...

G4FFY: A higher activity month with entries in the 2m & 70cm UKACs, as well as the April FT4 Contest. Also did some SSB operating from the Motorhome working some International Marconi Day stations. As of end-March 2024 I'm still on 161 DXCC's.

M0CGF: Back from Bangladesh.

G4FYF: Very little commentary, nothing stunning, usual stuff on 40 & 20 m.

MOLEP: April had a few days in which I did a fair bit of SOTA chasing, so my League table entry's slightly better than last month's. There've been a few activations on islands, of which Svalbard (JW) was probably the most unusual from a SOTA point of view.

The cumulative scores are shown below. Ray G4FFY, Steve G4FYF and Rick M0LEP retain first, third and sixth places: Ian M0CGF moves up three places to second, Quin G3WRR moves down one to fourth (serves him right for not submitting an entry...) and sadly but inevitably Peter G3ZPB moves down two places to fourth.
